You can also use internally to increase organizational support for your sustainability initiatives. 2. E-learning Modules	Online sustainability courses can be a component of your council professional development or community education programs. E-learning is one tool you can use to help council staff understand what sustainability means and how to apply principles to their work. 3. E-survey	A useful way of gaining feedback from your community. Councils have also used as a tool to gauge staff attitudes towards sustainability.	Survey Monkey is one of many helpful survey design and management tools www.surveymonkey.com
4. Video and Photo Sharing	You can use free sites such as Youtube or Flickr to capture the excitement of your sustainability event. You could also run a sustainability video contest. 5. Blogs	Blogs can be used to provide a commentary or news on a sustainability issue. Blogs tend to be a one way communication tool.
